ATTENDANCE POLICY

The Vincennes University policy is based upon the notion that students will attend all sessions of the class in which they are enrolled. Students who miss class hours totaling twice the number of credit hours awarded for the course, or the equivalent of two weeks of class instruction, are eligible to be dropped from class.
